



What is a thesis statement?

A thesis statement is a roadmap that guides the reader through your paper. It is usually the last sentence of the introductory paragraph.

The thesis statement should:

1. Express the main idea of the paper (cover the *topic*)
2. Present an argument (have an *opinion*)
3. Guides the reader to your conclusion
4. Fit the scope of the assignment (are you writing a paper or a book?)

How do I know I have a good thesis statement?

- Double check your body paragraphs against what you wrote in your thesis. Did you guide the reader?
- Will the reader be interested to read further? Or, will the reader wonder "So what?" or "Who cares!" or "why should I read this?"

Phrases to avoid:

- In this paper...
- This paper will...
- I will attempt to...



- Last sentence of Intro Paragraph
- Covers what you will discuss in your paper in one clear idea
- Identifies the purpose of the paper
- Makes an assertion
- Is narrow
- Is specific

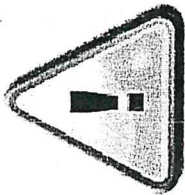
Writing a Thesis Statement
