Universal and correct wearing of masks	N	All students, staff and guest are required to wear mask on district campus and at all district sponsored events. The Navajo Nation has lifting the mask mandate for the general public but is still required for K-12 educational setting. Face masks are available for students, staff and guest at each school site.
Modifying facilities to allow for physical distancing (e.g., use of cohorts/podding)	N	Internal school policy - Class size is controlled/managed to assist with social distancing. Maintain social distancing to the extent practicable in the classrooms.
Handwashing and respiratory etiquette	N	Internal school policy - Handwashing and respiratory etiquette are scheduled at the elementary sites throughout the day. Hand Sanitizer is available at all sites. Posters are displayed at all restroom and handwashing stations.
Cleaning and maintaining healthy facilities, including improving ventilation	N	Buildings are cleaned each day. High touched areas are cleaned throughout the day. Staff cleaning procedures/training were provided by Hillyard and District Lead Custodian. HVAC systems have been updated and installed at school sites.
Contact tracing in combination with isolation and quarantine, in collaboration with the State, local, territorial, or Tribal health departments	N	Internal policy of contact tracing and activities are coordinated by the District COVID -19 Coordinator in accordance with updated CDC Guidelines.
Diagnostic and screening testing	N	Staff, students are guest are asked verbal screening questions regarding COVID-19. If a yes on any questions, they are advised to seek testing at local COVID 19 Testing site. COVID Test kits are available to all students and employees through the HR Department.
Efforts to provide vaccinations to school communities	N	WRUSD has a partnership with Tsehootsooi Medical Center to provide vaccinations to staff and students.
Appropriate accommodations for children with disabilities with respect to health and safety policies	Y	Appropriate accommodations are being followed and regulated on an individual student needs according to laws and regulations. Oversight by WRUSD ESS Director.

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Coordination with State and local health officials	N	Our district works with the Navajo Nation Department of Health Services and Indian Health Services.

### How the LEA will Ensure Continuity of Services?

Window Rock USD will ensure continuity of services by offering In-Person Learning for all students in PreK to 12<sup>th</sup> grade. In addition, Window Rock USD has social/emotional processes and personnel in place to address the mental health of students both in-person and remote. Purchase supplies, equipment, and services to support the academic and emotional needs to provide a safe educational environment conducive to learning.

### Students' Needs:

Academic Needs	WRUSD hosts in-person for all students PreK to 12 <sup>th</sup> grade. WRUSD will invest in hardware and software to further empower our technology capacity to enhance student learning. Provide individualized educational programs after school and on Saturday's to increase learning opportunities for all students.
Social, Emotional and Mental Health Needs	Students have access to counselors and mental health counselors to assist them with their mental health needs. WRUSD will continue to collaborate with Navajo Nation and TMC to meet the social, emotional and mental health needs of staff and students.
Other Needs (which may include student health and food services)	Our schools are working with TMC and with the Navajo Nation to ensure that students have access to Covid and Flu vaccination. District will host TMC at school sites for vaccinations shots. We will continue to provide breakfast and lunch every day for all enrolled students. During summer months we also operate a community feeding program that allows all community children age 18 or under to eat breakfast and lunch regardless of enrollment status.

### Staff Needs:

Social, Emotional and Mental Health Needs	Staff are also advised to utilized Employee Assistance Program for their social, emotional and mental health needs without leaving the comfort of their home. Employees also have access to TELEDOC 24/7 by app or telephone at no cost. Medical and prescription benefit coverage is available at no cost for the full-time employees.
Other Needs	Not at this time.
